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### From The Co-Headteachers

We have seen so much joy in learning this halfterm, mostly related to insects! It has been a very exciting time in Early Years as the children have been learning about Minibeasts. They have been learning their names in English and French and looking at their body parts and where they live. The children have begun to understand the





concept of a lifecycle, with a particular focus on the lifecycle of a butterfly. To help the children understand this, there have been real caterpillars in tubs in the classrooms. We have watched them grow steadily day by day. As we write, the caterpillars have wrapped themselves into cocoons, but after half term we hope to see them emerge and become beautiful butterflies, flying around their butterfly house.

Now the weather is warmer, we have also been in the garden searching for other creatures as part of our mini-beasts topic. It has been joyous to see the children's faces light up with glee as they find various creepy-crawlies in the shrubs or under rocks.

# **News from Nursery Class**

The nursery class children have been super busy this half term! The children have enjoyed learning about our topics on life cycles, mini beasts and pets.

The children have had opportunities in our creative sessions to paint mini beasts independently, copying a sample. We have painted butterflies, caterpillars, ladybirds and bumblebees. The children were able to make ladybirds using their cutting skills by cutting around shapes.

In literacy, we have continued blending sounds in Circle Time with the help of Tom the Tiger. Tom is our little phonics puppet, Tom sounds out simple words and the children have opportunities to say what word he is sounding out. It is a fun way for the children to blend sounds.

In numeracy, we have been learning to recognise the written numerals to 100. The children have also been practising to form the written numbers 1-10. We have also been learning about 2D and 3D shapes.

The children have really enjoyed "Show and Tell". Thank you for all your support.

# **News from Reception Class**

Just as the Summer term whizzes past, it has been a very busy time in Reception class. In the Maths lessons the children have been learning about Time, Shapes, Patterns, practising Addition, Subtraction and Money. They helped to fill a number grid to 100 with 1 pence coins, only to find out that it was just worth £1. They had fun counting in twos, fives and tens and learnt to buy toys of their choice from our makeshift shop using coins.





In our Literacy lessons they made an effort at independent writing after listening to the story of The Very Hungry Caterpillar and The Bad tempered Ladybird.

Our PE lessons have been about preparing for Sports Day and practising racing, working in pairs to throw and catch a ball and learning to kick it.

As part of our topic work on Lifecycle of a plant, the children sowed a runner bean seed, nurtured it and were very excited to see it grow. The topic of Dinosaurs helped them to learn about the different types, their habitats, their food and why they became extinct. The volcan'o eruption experiment with Miss Turei caused amazement and excitement. In the art lessons the children worked with clay, playdough, made and painted Dinosaurs and experimented making new colours by mixing paints.

## **News from Year 1**

This half term has flown by and the children have produced some amazing work during this time. The children have absolutely loved learning about the Great Fire of London and can recall all key facts. They have been working on a diary entry from 1666 (see Star of the Week photo), as well as a news report from this period. We aptly named our paper 'The Pudding Lane Times' and had fun doing 'live' reports, as well as written ones. The whole class are trying so hard with their writing and it is paying off, as I find myself, marking work that is beautifully constructed and in flowing, joined up handwriting. It is a great pleasure to read!

In Maths, we have recently focused on addition and subtraction patterns. The children have loved learning our 'Hey 20' song to recall number facts to 20 and this has helped them a great deal in their learning. They have even begun to write their own word problems (see photo), as we spent time discussing the language used in association with each operation  $(- + x \div)$ .

In Science, we have been looking at forces and experimenting with pushes and pulls. This is a very handson topic, which the class have all clearly enjoyed. They have also been extremely enthusiastic about our Healthy Living topic, sharing ideas about how they might eat more healthily and other ways in which we can look after our bodies. It is wonderful to see the children beginning to make their own informed decisions.

It is lovely that we can have more of our PE lessons outside and the sunshine was a welcome visitor during this half term! We look forward to a sunny, happy and fulfilling rest of the summer term. Have a lovely break! Mrs Conway













# **Computing**

This half-term seems to have flown by! Our Nursery children helped to sequence the story of 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar' and sorted out Ted's day too. These skills will help as they move on to putting instructions in the correct order to create algorithms. They have also been introduced to the Beebots...as you can probably imagine, those sessions were very lively!



The children in our Reception class enjoyed listening to and watching Eric Carle reading his book 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar' before creating pictograms to show just how much food the caterpillar had eaten. The following lesson they used the skills they had gained to show information about some teddy bears having a picnic – the display of their work in their classroom looked lovely. They have also used an interactive game to position 2D shapes to make a picture before using the 'paint brushes' to match the colours.



Our Year 1 children have been learning about emojis and using the symbols to crack codes.




They also used emojis to show how they might feel in certain situations – this was linked to the e-safety part of our curriculum.

Interactive activities have helped them to find out more about healthy living (to reinforce their classroom topic) and they carried out a survey to collect information about their favourite fruits, vegetables and cereals. They used the data collected to create tick charts on the computer. These were added to their 'Being Healthy' display. Our Treasure Hunt game gave them the chance to use their knowledge of position and movement as they followed instructions to hunt for the hidden treasure!

### **Magic Moments**

As we enter the final term of the academic year, the teachers are pulling together evidence for the childrens' end of year reports and The Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) profiles. We want to include evidence from you, the parents, not just what we see at school. We will use anything relevant that you have already included in the scrapbook or the link book, but we really need much more evidence from home; for this reason we are introducing Magic Moments Slips. This is important because the



EYFS profile and report is supposed to be a complete picture of your child's development, not just a snapshot of what happens at school. Sometimes, children might show skills at home that their teacher doesn't see – for instance, if your child is very shy at school, the teacher might think that they're not reaching the expected level for self-confidence and self-awareness, but at home, they might be outgoing and chatty. We look forward to receiving your Magic Moments.
