This half term we have welcomed three new children all who have settled very well and are clearly enjoying their time at Roxeth Mead. The children who have been in Pre-School for longer, have shown care and empathy towards the new children who have fitted happily into our little class.

We started the term looking at our topics 'Winter' and 'Artic Animals'. We have developed and consolidated new and old skills



such as cutting (making snowflakes), threading in and out and over and under a snowman. This helps to develop the children's fine motor skills especially the tripod grasp. The children have also enjoyed looking at freezing and melting, assembling penguins and imitating seal movements (Mrs Patel will not let us put the photo of her being a seal in this newsletter!!). Our week celebrating Chinese New Year was fun. It is the year of the rat and the children really enjoyed making rat puppets. They also enjoyed tasting Chinese foods and making a Chinese dish.

As we write we are thinking about people who help us and we were surprised that the children were so knowledgeable in this subject and showed a great deal of interest. The children loved wearing police hats and using magnifying glasses to track down some missing teddy bears. I am pleased to report all the lost teddies were located!! We are ready to work around our theme this week 'Whatever Next' by Jill Murphy.

# **News from Nursery Class**

What a busy start to the new year it has been. We would like to welcome the new children who moved up from the pre-school class, Anouska, Rufus, Penelope and Mackenzie.

Our topic learning has included learning about: winter wear and weather; arctic animals and their habitats; Chinese New Year, and the emergency services. The children loved doing our Storyland topic, for which we chose the traditional tale, The Three Little Pigs, as it is a favourite classic. We learned about narrative language and joining in with repeated refrains from the story.

In literacy we have been continuing to progress with our phonics. The children have been learning to link sounds to familiar



objects and are now blending sounds to read three letter CVC words confidently. The children are beginning to write CVC words independently when they are spelt out such as cat, mat, tin, fin, man, fan etc. Why not try these at home? In numeracy, the children are continuing to work towards counting objects reliably to 10 and recording their answers. We are also working hard to recognising the written numerals 1-100.

We wish you a happy half term break, Mrs Afsari and Miss Turie






# **News from Reception Class**

The first half of this Spring Term has been quite busy and the children in Reception Class have worked hard and with a great deal of enthusiasm.

Our Topic related activities have helped the children to learn about the Arctic and the animals that live there, celebrate Chinese New Year by taking part in it, learning about winter and animals hibernating.

They engaged in role play to learn about 'People Who Help Us'. They donned their baker's hats and aprons to take on the role of bakers for the day. They setup a bakery, made bread rolls, managed the till, took money from customers, served tea and cakes and wrote



In Literacy the children are making good progress in reading and writing, developing fluency in reading and attempting independent writing. They have written out a recipe, a list of Arctic animals, talked

about the characters and setting of a story. They learnt about Fiction and Non Fiction books and looked at a cook book to find out the recipe for making bread rolls. In their Phonics lessons they are currently consolidating Set 2 long vowel sounds and starting to learn the set 3 sounds.

In Maths the children have been learning numbers to 100, counting in tens and simple addition and subtraction, whilst using a number line. They have enjoyed learning about 2 and 3D shapes, the weight of objects (heavy and light) and using scales to measure them. During our lessons on capacity they have been using solids and liquids and making predictions and estimating. In our lessons on money they have learnt coin recognition and how to add to make various amounts. They looked at various coins with a magnifying glass to find a picture of the Queen on all of them.

In our PE lessons the children have been practising 'catching and throwing' skills using beanbags. In our Music and Movement lessons they have played various instruments, attempted the dragon dance, performed to action songs and enacted out stories. The cookery lessons helped to develop their grating, chopping, sieving, mixing, kneading and rolling skills. In the Art lessons the children used chalk to create Winter pictures, cut out Snowflakes, painted polar bears, walruses, made lanterns, dragons, bakers hats, aprons. All of this

helping to develop the various skills of drawing, painting, cutting, folding, decorating and creating patterns.

Well done to all the children and a big Thank You to all the parents for supporting your children in their learningjourney.Mrs Kalsi and Mrs Ghatora.






# News from Year 1 & 2


I have seen some marked changes in the Year 1 & 2 children this half term. They came back after Christmas refreshed, positive and ready to learn and I have been so impressed with the work they have produced. It has been a real privilege to teach them! We have also welcomed Mrs Azar into our class and we are all very grateful for her help.

In Literacy we have been looking at poetry and the children wrote the most wonderful Winter poems (see pictures below). We spent a great deal of time exploring the features of poetry and this shows through their amazing independent work. Our 'Word of the Day' (see above right) has helped enhance their



vocabularies and this is becoming increasingly evident in their writing. The children have also worked hard in RWI, sharpening comprehension skills and practising reading with clarity and expression. It is wonderful to see how they are taking ownership over their work and gaining confidence daily.

In Science we have been learning about plants and completing our own 'Bean Diaries'. The children loved planting their beans and watching them weekly to document their growth (see photo) and it has made us all very excited for the Spring flowers to bloom.



In History we have all enjoyed learning about significant people, including Ibn Battuta, Neil Armstrong and Christopher Columbus. Our work has produced some interesting conversations about what makes someone important and how people can become well-known for such a wide variety of reasons.

In Maths we have been working in small groups and covering an array of topics, including estimating, time, balancing and number work. The class point system keeps children motivated to complete their work and we all enjoy the end of week 'prize giving' for the point's winner.

I know the children look forward to their Thursday afternoons with Mrs Alfano and made beautiful money bags for the Chinese New Year. Along with their PE sessions on a Friday and French lessons with Mrs Isaacs, they are gaining a wide breadth of learning across the curriculum. It is so inspiring to see their progress and personal development, both academically and behaviourally.


We hope these photos will serve as a nice keepsakes for you and perhaps a nice Easter gift for grandparents too.






That afternoon we will have an Egg Hunt. More details from the PTA, nearer the time.

# Parent and Carer Online Toolkit (Childnet)

The new non-statutory guidance published in the summer, Teaching Online Safety (2019, DfES), recommends that schools 'Proactively [engage] staff, pupils and parents/carers in school activities that promote the agreed principles of online safety' (see paragraph 42).

Childnet have updated their parent and carer toolkit that will help parents have conversations about online safety. Their booklet 'Let's talk about life online' includes ten key messages that should be shared with children:

- 1. "You can always come to me if you need help."
- 2. "What would you do if this happened...?"
- 3. "Remember that not everyone is who they say they are online."
- 4. "Keep your personal information safe, and other people's too."
- 5. "Be respectful to others online."
- 6. "Think before you post."
- 7. "Remember to ask if it's okay."
- 8. "Remember not everything is true online."
- 9. "The things other people post online might not always show what their life is really like."
- 10. "Recognise how going online makes you feel and take a break when you need to."

# Side Gate and Door

# Allergies

We now have 2 pupils in the school who have life-threateningly allergies to nuts. PLEASE do not send anything into school that contains nuts.

# Uniform

Thank you for ensuring your children are looking smart in the correct uniform for school. Please can we remind you that the childrens' coats should be **<u>black</u>** and warm enough for very cold days, as we do like to get the children outside whenever we can for fresh air and a run around. Children also need a regulation school hat; we have a few second hand ones that can be purchased for £4.

# Parking

Please be considerate of our neighbours and do NOT park across their drives. We have received a number of complaints from our neighbours recently about this. We would prefer you to be a few minutes late picking up whilst waiting for a suitable space, than block our neighbours' drives.

# Eye Testing Letter from Public Health

I am writing to you regarding the importance of testing your child's vision, in particular but not only before your child turns 6 years old.

Amblyopia (also commonly called 'lazy eye') affects about 1 in 50 children and can be treated effectively if it is caught early enough. A lazy eye does not usually cause symptoms. Younger children are often unaware that there's anything wrong with their vision and, if they are, they're usually unable to explain what's wrong. Left untreated, this can lead to the eye's central vision never reaching normal levels. There are a number of other eye conditions that your child should be checked for. Free NHS eye tests are available at opticians for children under the age of 16 (under 19 if in full-time education) and I would strongly encourage you to make sure you take your child for an eye test on a regular basis. It is recommended that most people including children should get their eyes tested every 2 years unless your doctor, ophthalmic practitioner or optometrist thinks you should be tested more often.
