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Safer Internet Day

On Tuesday 7th February the children in our Squirrel and Tiger classes joined schools and youth organisations across the UK in celebrating Safer Internet Day 2023. This is a global campaign to promote the safe and responsible use of technology. Using the internet safely and positively is a key message that we promote at Roxeth Mead School and celebrating Safer Internet Day is a great opportunity for us to re-emphasise the online safety messages we deliver throughout the year. The activities used during this session were the perfect way to kickstart conversations about life online.







We started our morning by looking at an e-book called 'On the Internet' – this is published by Childnet International (www.childnet.com) and highlighted some of the many ways we use the internet. The children spoke enthusiastically about seeing people use mobile phones, iPads, smart speakers and laptops. They also took part in activities to consider who they could talk to if something made them feel sad or worried.

This message was reinforced by 'Hanni and the Magic Window' – Hanni's home has a very special magic window but when Hanni sees something that upsets her, she struggles to explain what has happened. Can she find the words to get the help she needs? It highlights how important it is that children know not only <u>who</u> to ask for help but also <u>how</u> to ask. The board game 'Can you help me please?' gave the Tiger class a chance to practise asking for help when they were presented with various situations. The children thought about how each scenario might make them feel and who would be the best person to talk to. They also put together a sentence asking for help with that situation.

Both classes thought about other people who help us too. The Squirrel class completed a stick and paste matching activity while the Tiger class worked with incident matching cards.



The children also put puzzle pieces of people who help us back together whilst talking about how those people help us.





Before being presented with very well deserved certificates, the children watched 'Jessie and Friends: Watching Videos' (www.thinkuknow.co.uk) – this is the first in a series of animations which begins with Jessie and her dog, named Dog, looking at videos online using a tablet. Together they learn that while the internet can be enjoyable and fun, there are sometimes things online that can be upsetting or scary. It includes 'The Funny Tummy Song' which reminds Jessie that she can always speak to a grown-up who will be able to help her and put down the tablet if there is anything she sees or hears online that makes her feel worried, scared or sad.

We have converted the hall into a bright and inviting space, with enough room for climbing and ride on toys as well as a reading area, craft area and free play. daily routines. Without a doubt we can say that music and movement and also story time seem to be the favourites with all of them.

In the first two weeks of term, our topic was Winter. The children listened to songs and also made some winter artwork including snow pictures, snowflakes and snowmen, we also touched ice to

feel the cold and slippery texture. After that, we learnt about the story Goldilocks and the Three Bears and learnt a song relating to the story. The children have been comparing sizes and looking at different sized chairs, bowls etc. They have been painting pictures of bears and have used different materials to create lovely artwork. Well done to all of them.

The children are beginning to copy most actions to familiar songs and

repeat words time to time of course depending on their mood on the day! We have also been looking at different shapes, colours, numbers, letters and their sounds. The children getting used to Circle Time, and as the days go on, they are getting more and more used to sitting and joining in.

News From The Lower Pre-School (Parrot Class)

How can January have come and gone so quickly? Despite those dark, cold mornings we have enjoyed a happy and productive half term and it has, as ever, been delightful to see the children having fun together and seeing their independence increase. I love to see the children make up games and scenarios and, by providing an enabling environment, such as our three bears house, it helps them use their imaginative skills and use the resources available to them.

> We started the term with our topic 'Winter'. We have sorted 'snowballs' into size, painted, collaged, printed polar bears footprints in the snow, and used our cutting skills to make snowflakes. We have used scissors for many activities, including cutting tagliatelle to make a delicious and healthy pasta dish.

Our next topic, which ran over three weeks, was looking closely at the story of Goldilocks and the Three Bears. I cannot believe how much learning we have gained from this! Lots of mathematical language has been used, such as describing size, position and quantity, as well as practising fine motor skills by threading around a bear (an excellent activity to promote the correct pencil grasp) using our senses with dry then wet porridge oats, sequencing events within the plot and listening to

the sounds of the voices of the three bears. We have read the story several times, we had fun doing a quiz without the book, and I can honestly say I was amazed that the children knew, and could recall, every detail!

I am sure every member of staff will tell you what a huge success our sensory room has been! The children love it and we try to visit as much as we can.

News From The Upper Pre-School Room (Squirrels)

What a busy start to the year it has been in Squirrel Class. The children came back from the Christmas holidays full of smiles. We have started teaching phonics and the children have really taken well to it and enjoy our fun and interactive phonic sessions. This half term we have introduced the letter sounds m, a, s, d, t and you will find that your child can now recognise these letters phonetically and link them to a familiar object. The children have also had opportunities to develop their writing skills and are currently practising forming these letters with the aid of our



reading and writing scheme Read, Write, Inc. In numeracy, the children have been consolidating their knowledge of counting to quantity and linking numerals and amounts to the right number of objects. We have also been working on our mathematical language of small,

Our topic work has comprised of Winter and the story of Goldilocks and the Three Bears. The children have particularly enjoyed learning this topic as they had sensorial experiences with porridge and had the opportunity to feed the bears porridge. The children made porridge and had a little taster session choosing their favourite topping and they also had a chance to act out the story with masks and props. The children were asked to follow a picture sequence of the story showing them that a story has a beginning, a middle and an ending.

Our arts and crafts sessions have been teacher led and the children are able to follow simple instructions and follow a sample in order to achieve the desired outcome. During our free painting and crafts sessions, we encourage the children to use their imagination to paint and create with a purpose in mind.

News From The Nursery and Reception Room (Tigers)

It has been a great start to the new term in 'Tiger Class.' This term we have welcomed Adam and Jia to our class and they have settled in very well.



In Phonics, we have continued to practise the sounds of the letters and the children are now beginning to read CVC letters with growing confidence. They have been

practising forming letters and are doing very well. We have been listening out for rhyming words in stories and poems and the children are getting very good at pointing them out.

In our Maths lessons, the children have been consolidating their understanding of the topics covered last term through practical work. They

are getting good at number recognition, putting them in the right order, learning about 2D&3D shapes, creating repeating patterns, counting out, writing numbers and playing number games.



Our topic work has been fun and the children have engaged with a great deal of enthusiasm. Our first topic was 'Winter' and the children made snow using cornflour and the snowballs turned into a snowman.



They cut out snowflakes, made a snowman dressed in a hat and scarf and helped to create an impressive list of winter weather words. We conducted an experiment where we made ice and put it in warm water, cold water and left some at room temperature to see which one would melt first. The children learnt to make predictions and they were absolutely right when the ice cubes in the warm water melted first.

Our next topic was the storybook 'Goldilocks and the Three Bears' and the children loved listening to the story and songs. They used the finger puppets to become the characters from the story, made porridge, used oats for learning about measuring and capacity. They have used our story board to put their coloured pictures of the characters. They have made different sized bears, painted porridge bowls and made patterned quilts for the beds

We celebrated Chinese New Year and the children made lanterns, noodles and performed the ribbon dance to music. The children have enjoyed playing in our Sensory Room and are always very excited to tell others about it. They have been working hard in all the areas of the curriculum and their growing confidence and independence is a testament to their hard work. Well done to all the lovely children in Tiger Class.

Parent / Teacher Meetings

We do not produce a written report this term, but the teacher will be able to discuss with you in detail the progress of your child. Please liaise with the class teacher at drop off or pickup to book a time for your meeting.

Letters and Numbers Games for 3 to 4-year-olds

Playing games with letters and numbers will help your child get ready for reading when they're older. There are all sorts of games you can play ranging from using the letters shapes and sounds, to learning new words that share the same first letter.

Top tips

- Count aloud with your child. You could find out how many steps you need to take to get to the front door or the number of lampposts you pass as you walk to the park!
- Look out for numbers your child will recognise, such as your door number or their age, and see if you can find these numbers on buses, shops or road signs. Remember that letters and numbers are everywhere!
- Talk about the letters you can find in junk mail and old magazines. Cut some of the letters out and make a collage. See if you can find the first letter of your child's name. If they can't recognise the letter yet, draw it together and see if you can spot it when you're out and about.

To encourage your child's early reading, use letter sounds instead of alphabet letter names. Using letter sounds when you play games like 'I'm going to the park' or 'I spy' together will help them sound out words as they learn to read.

Letter game: Going to the park!

- Play a game taking turns saying what you'd take on a trip to the park.
- The rule is that you can only take things with a 'p' sound (for example, 'I'm going to the park and I'm going to take a picnic/parrot/pencil').
- You can have more fun by changing the place you are going. For example, to the seaside, where you can only bring things beginning with 's'.

Have a go at making letter shapes together out of playdough.

How to make your own playdough:

- Mix together:
- two cups of plain flour
- ½ cup of cold water
- three tablespoons of vegetable oil
- one tablespoon lemon juice (optional)
- any food colouring or glitter

The Importance of Nursery Rhymes

All children like songs and rhymes, even small babies. They like your voice, the repetitive language and the actions.

- You will be supporting them to learn to talk as they become familiar with the words and rhythm, and begin to imitate the sounds you make, or join in with the words.
- You will support the bond between you to develop as you look at each other and imitate one another's
 actions. You will be supporting them to develop muscle control and coordination as you help them to
 follow the actions in rhymes.
- You will be supporting pre-reading and pre-writing skills as they develop phonological awareness by hearing sounds in the rhymes.
- You will support them to learn to count, add and subtract numbers when you sing number rhymes.
