

News from Toddler (Butterfly) Class

We've had a wonderful and busy term in Butterfly Class! The children settled in beautifully after the October half-term, embracing a variety of activities with enthusiasm.

Our first topic, "Autumn and Festivals," has been a delightful journey of learning and celebration. From exploring the beauty of the changing seasons to discovering the Diwali festival, the children engaged in such an inspiring way. News From Pre-School (Parrot Class)

It is hard to believe we are here writing another newsletter so soon, because time really has just flown by. The children continue to flourish since the last term and it's been a joy to watch their friendships and confidence grow. Each new activity brings excitement, and their willingness to try new things is truly inspiring.

At the start of the term, we explored the magic of festivals with a focus on the Diwali - Festival of Light and Bonfire Night. The children created dazzling fireworks with coloured rice called 'Rangoli' which they loved to create. They also used plenty of glitter to craft fireworks, and created some lovely pieces and their excitement brought a festive sparkle to the classroom allowing them to explore and express their creativity.

Autumn brought us plenty of outdoor fun! The children were so engaged as they explored the seasonal tuff tray and went on a treasure trail in the garden, finding pinecones and conkers to use for art projects. We later used the conkers for "Conker rolling" with paint which was a big hit, and they loved stomping in crunchy leaves and talking about the colours of autumn. We also discussed animal hibernation, sparking curiosity as the children learned how animals prepare for the colder months.

This term, we've also taken our first steps into phonics, starting with the letter "s." We have introduced the sound of the word and they have great fun sounding it out. We used a variety of different words and with assistance we are beginning to associate and use these sounds in the class.

We have had lots of cooking fun as we created some delicious treats. We really encourage the children to learn about the difference in how a few simple things turn into something wonderful. This not only enhances their vocabulary but also aids to their understanding of the world. This term the children enjoyed making a fruit salad, jam tarts, a "twinkle star" sandwich as well as candy cane cookies.

During nursery rhyme week their enthusiasm for singing and movement has been wonderful to see, and they are growing more confident with every activity they have taken part in. This ranged from singing, actions, dancing and colouring in worksheets. Music and rhymes have been a fantastic way to help them connect sounds and letters while having lots of fun.

Now, as Christmas approaches, the children are fully immersed in the festive spirit! They've been busy making beautiful cards and creating their class wish list for Santa. The highlight of the season has been rehearsing for the Nativity play—they've been singing and signing with such big smiles so fingers crossed it all goes well on the day!It really has

been heart-warming to see their excitement as they bring the story of baby Jesus to life.

The children had so much fun being captured by the story of Cinderella as we had the pop-up pantomime visit us. They were left mesmerised with the performance, and sat so beautiful during the entire show. There was plenty of laughter, and engagement throughout the show as the children clapped and sang along.

Finally, the children have worn some special Christmas jumpers to celebrate the festive spirit. Our Christmas party preparations are in full swing and the children have been busy decorating special hats for the party!

Our cookery lessons with Mrs Ghatora and Miss Gohil have been very popular and the children are always excited to know what they are cooking next. These lessons have helped them to develop their fine motor skills, taught them to listen to and follow instructions, acquire new vocabulary, learn about capacity

The children engaged in hands on exploration of pinecones, conkers, acorns and Autumn leaves. We used these for counting, creating a repeating pattern, making a collage and leaf printing. 48hr Sickness Rule

 Vomiting and diarrhoea. Children with diarrhoea and/or vomiting should definitely be kept off school until at least 48 hours after their symptoms have gone. Most cases of <u>diarrhoea and</u> <u>vomiting in children</u> get better without treatment, but if symptoms persist, consult your GP.

We adhere to this to ensure complete recovery and reduce the possibility of infection for other children and staff. Thank you for your cooperation.

Working Family Funding
