What a wonderful half-term we've had! The past few weeks have been truly fantastic, and it's been so rewarding to see all the children flourish in every area of their development. To begin, we focused on the season of winter. Over the past few weeks, the children have taken part in a range of activities, including using various art materials to create polar bears, penguins, and winter trees, as well as crafting snowflakes and snow pictures. We were lucky to have a bit of snow fall on one of our days, so we collected some for the children to explore. They loved feeling the cold texture of the snow, and we also made some fake snow for them to play with. Alongside these activities, we sang the *Snowman* song and enjoyed reading winter-themed books.

Next, we moved on to celebrating Chinese New Year. The children had a fantastic time with all the exciting activities we had planned. We used flashcards to show them images of how Chinese New Year is celebrated, and they really enjoyed looking at the pictures. The activity that sparked the most joy was our food tasting session, where the children tried spring rolls. I was amazed at how eager and excited everyone was to take part. Currently, our theme is space. The children have been busy creating galaxies and star stamps using a variety of art materials. We've also been exploring pictures of the moon, stars, rockets, and other space-related images, which the children have found truly fascinating. We've been reading space-themed books and singing the nursery rhyme *Zoom, Zoom, We're Going to the Moon*. The children have also enjoyed experimenting with black playdough and creating prints using foil.

News from Toddler (Butterfly) Class

How is it that just a few weeks ago, we were all wishing each other a "Happy New Year"? It's wonderful now to experience the lighter mornings and afternoons, and to see the first signs of spring in our garden, with the snowdrops beginning to sprout.

This term has brought some lovely new additions to Butterfly Class. We've welcomed Kieran and Musa from the Baby Room, as well as Akram, who had an older sibling here. As always, they have settled in beautifully, and it's been a joy watching them learn from the older children. It's heart-warming to see them sitting so well for registration, stories, singing, and circle time. Every child in Butterfly Class understands the expectations and is becoming increasingly independent at snack and lunchtime. Well done to all of you!

For the first time ever, the weather has truly cooperated with our seasonal lessons.

We were able to start the term by talking about 'Winter' on the very first day, when snow began to fall. This made the topic come alive for the children, and many of them experienced snow for the first time, which they thoroughly enjoyed. We bundled up in hats, scarves, coats, and mittens, braving the chilly garden for outdoor play, showing the children that with the right clothing, most weather can be enjoyed, while also emphasizing the importance of fresh air and exercise.

We've had lots of fun exploring the season with activities like printing, painting, collaging, and even using tweezers to hunt for penguins in the "snow." The children have also had the chance to touch ice and learn about the importance of feeding birds during winter.

Sensory play is such an important part of early childhood, and in Butterfly Class, the children have plenty of opportunities for it—from making dough and playing with fake snow to taking part in regular cookery activities.

We also celebrated Chinese New Year with colourful crafts, making lanterns, creating snakes (since 2025 is the Year of the Snake), and sharing Chinese food during a tasting session.

Our current theme is Space, and the children are enjoying catchy songs, making space rockets and star-shaped sandwiches, and reading the beloved book *Whatever Next* by Jill Murphy, along with many other space-themed stories.

It has been a lovely half-term, filled with learning and fun, and we are already looking forward to the next one. As the weather continues to improve, we can begin enjoying our grassed areas more, and the fun and learning will carry on.

News From Pre-School (Parrot Class)

It feels like only yesterday I was writing the very first newsletter for Parrot Class, and now, with a heavy heart, I'm writing my last one. What a truly fantastic journey it has been! On a brighter note, we've had the pleasure of welcoming Mrs. Layla, who has quickly become a favourite with the children, and our lovely new addition, Izabella, who has settled in wonderfully.



This term has been packed with exciting learning experiences, hands-on activities, and lots of fun as our little Parrots explored, created, and discovered across the seven key areas of learning.

Winter Wonderland - We kicked off the term by diving into the magical world of winter. Through sensory activities,

crafts, and nursery rhymes, the children explored the season and sparked their curiosity about the changing world around them. They created adorable penguins, polar bears, and a snowman, and we ventured into the icy habitats of the Arctic and Antarctic to learn about the incredible animals that live there. The children now confidently recognise animals like the Snowy Owl, Husky, and Beluga Whale! To bring our learning to life, we went on a nature walk to observe how winter affects trees, plants, and wildlife. We also talked about hibernation and how some animals sleep through the colder months. The children were thrilled to spot snowdrops blooming and



took great joy in feeding the birds, which deepened their awareness of the changing seasons.

Chinese New Year Celebrations - Our next adventure took us to the vibrant celebrations of Chinese New Year! The children had a blast making a delicious noodle salad, practicing using chopsticks, and even learning a song in Mandarin—"Kung Hei Fat Choi" (Happy New Year!). They also enjoyed a ribbon dance to *Twinkle, Twinkle, Little Star* in Mandarin, twirling with joy. We got creative by making our own playdough, painting glittery lanterns, and crafting traditional red envelopes, which symbolise good luck and prosperity. These activities sparked wonderful discussions about different cultures and traditions, helping the children appreciate and understand celebrations from around the world.





Blast Off into Space! - Our latest topic has been truly out of this world! We embarked on an intergalactic adventure, turning our classroom into a space station where the children pretended to be astronauts,

blasting off to explore the moon and stars. They had a fantastic time building paper rockets, painting planets, and singing the *Zoom Zoom Moon* song! We

also explored the enchanting story *Whatever Next!* by Jill Murphy, which quickly became a class favourite. The children loved imagining their own space adventures, using props and storytelling to develop their creativity and vocabulary. Our little astronomers also enjoyed



stargazing and making star prints, creating their own stunning 'starry night' paintings.

Mini Masterchefs at Work! It's been a busy term in the kitchen! Our little chefs have whipped up tasty treats, from pizzas and rice cake faces to Chinese noodle salad, rocket kebabs, and moon rocks! Food preparation has been a fantastic way to teach valuable life skills, with a focus on food hygiene, independence, and creativity. The children took great pride in their creations—and, of course, loved tasting them with you too!

This term has truly been magical, filled with learning, laughter, and endless creativity. The children have enjoyed every experience and are already looking forward to more exciting adventures next term!

News from Nursery (Tigers) Class

The Spring term started with the children coming back after the holidays, full of enthusiasm and excited to share their holiday stories with their classmates.





Our first topic this term was 'Winter' and the children created lovely patterns on Winter clothes, cut out snowflakes, learnt a Snowman action song, created an impressive list of Winter weather words and made snow using cornflour. We had snowfall in the classroom and the children enjoyed throwing cottonwool snowballs at one another. The storybook 'Poles Apart' took them on a journey from the North to the South Pole. The children were amazed by the animals that live in such harsh conditions in these parts of the world.



We celebrated Chinese New Year at school and the children made lanterns, cooked noodles, performed the Ribbon dance, made a Dragon and learnt how people celebrate it around the world. Two of the children in our class dressed up in their traditional costume and

their shared experience with others.



Our next topic was 'Space' and it caught the children's imagination where they packed their bags, ready for a Space adventure. The children enacted out the story 'Whatever Next!' and flew on a rocket to the Moon for a picnic. They learnt the 'Planet song' and decided which planet was their favourite. They made spaceships, rockets, drew pictures of aliens and enjoyed weighing Moon rocks. They were

inspired by the story of 'The Man on the Moon' and thought it would be cool to go to the Moon.

In Phonics we have continued to practise the sounds of the letters, and the children are now beginning to attempt reading CVC words with growing Rhyming words in stories and poems.


Zoolab Visit

Childcare Funding

A reminder that we participate in the Government's Scheme offering your child 15 or 30 hours' subsidised childcare per week. The funding commences the term **after** your child becomes eligible.

All working parents who earn less than £100,000 a year can apply for working parent funding from the term after your child turns 9 months old.

All parents, irrespective of income, can get 15 subsidised hours from the term **after your child's 3rd birthday**, starting on 1 January, 1 April or 1 September.

It is the parent's responsibility to get all the relevant codes and information to the Nursery in time, so that money can be claimed. If you do not submit this information, the Nursery cannot offer you the funding and you will be liable for the full fees.

NHS Pharmacy First Service

There is an NHS service, which is available in Boots pharmacies across England, called the **NHS Pharmacy First Service***. It enables children and adults to get convenient access to healthcare advice and treatment where appropriate, for seven common conditions without the potential delay of having to wait for a GP appointment. There is no need to make an appointment; parents or carers can pop into their local Boots pharmacy with their child and ask for help under the service. Support for the following conditions can be accessed under the service, free of charge (unless NHS prescription charges apply):

Common condition	Patient eligibility
Earache	1 to 17 years
Impetigo	1 year and over
Infected insect bites and stings	1 year and over
Sore throats	5 years and over
Sinusitis	12 years and over
Uncomplicated urinary tract	Women 16 to 64 years
Shingles	18 years and over


How to Help Your Child at Home - Letters and Numbers Games

Playing games with letters and numbers will help your child get ready for reading when they're older. There are all sorts of games you can play ranging from using the letters shapes and sounds, to learning new words that share the same first letter.

Top tips

- Count aloud with your child. You could find out how many steps you need to take to get to the front door or the number of lampposts you pass as you walk to the park!
- Look out for numbers your child will recognise, such as your door number or their age, and see if you can find these numbers on buses, shops or road signs. Remember that letters and numbers are everywhere!
- Talk about the letters you can find in junk mail and old magazines. Cut some of the letters out and make a collage. See if you can find the first letter of your child's name. If they can't recognise the letter yet, draw it together and see if you can spot it when you're out and about.

To encourage your child's early reading, use letter sounds instead of alphabet letter names. Using letter sounds when you play games like 'I'm going to the park' or 'I spy' together will help them sound out words as they learn to read.
