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
From The Headteacher

I am pleased to announce that Mrs Sheikh and Miss Shaheen will step up and become Co-Managers and we are also pleased to have welcomed Miss Faye (to the right in green) and Mrs Burney (in blue) who have joined us this month and bring many years of experience and expertise between them.







This half term has seen some lovely learning based on the topics of being healthy, spring, minibeasts and lifecycles. This topic linked superbly with the book "The Very Hungry Caterpillar". Our pupils have not only listened to the story but, inspired by the colourful illustrations of the caterpillar and the various foods he eats, have created some lovely artwork. To enhance their maths knowledge, the children practiced counting by keeping track of the caterpillar's

meals and sequencing the days of the week as depicted in the story. These activities have made learning numbers and order not just educational but also fun. The metamorphosis of the caterpillar into a butterfly is a central theme of the book and our little scientists have explored this concept through hands-on activities in our garden and looking at lifecycles in general. Through story time sessions, role-play and discussions, the children have expanded their vocabulary and language skills. They have learned new words and developed better listening skills. Re-enacting the story has also boosted their confidence in expressing themselves. News from Baby (Ladybird) Class

It is hard to believe that we are approaching the end of yet another exhilarating term - the time has truly flown by! It has been remarkable to witness the growth and development of the babies this term.

At the start of the term, we focused on healthy eating. The children thoroughly enjoyed this topic, participating in a variety of fun-filled activities. They created their own healthy plates, gluing different fruits and vegetables onto them, and made strawberries using crepe paper, developing their fine motor skills and hand-eye coordination as they carefully applied the paper using their pincer grip. One of their favourite activities was making a healthy eating basket, where they used different art materials—such as paint, crepe paper, and crayons—to create a variety of fruits and vegetables through painting, printing, and colouring.

As part of our healthy eating programme, we also explored learning about our bodies. We



provided a diverse range of obstacle equipment to encourage the children's physical development, allowing them to crawl through tunnels, climb slides, and jump on trampolines. Additionally, we introduced the different parts of the face, including the eyes, ears, mouth, and nose. To reinforce this learning, we sang the

nursery rhyme Head, Shoulders, Knees, and Toes, encouraging the children to sing along and identify their body parts.

Next, we moved on to our spring topic. The children explored flashcards featuring different spring images, helping them to observe and visualise seasonal changes. Using a variety of art materials, they created flowers, blossom trees, rainbows, and butterflies. Now that we are finally getting some sunshine, we

will be making the most of the lovely weather by spending plenty of time in the garden.



Our final topic of the term was minibeasts, and we were especially excited about the visit from Zoo Lab! The children had the opportunity to observe a variety of insects and minibeasts up close. We also provided sensory trays filled with minibeasts for them to dig and discover, fostering their curiosity and imaginative play. For our beautiful display board, we will created ladybirds and caterpillars, and during circle time,

we sang *Incy Wincy Spider*. As I write, we are looking forward to seeing all the parents at our Easter Parade. The children have been practising their songs beautifully!

News From Pre-School (Parrot Class)



What a pleasure it has been to be back in Pre-school for my last half term at Roxeth Mead! As always, the children have been happy, energetic and vibrant and willing to learn. They really are an enthusiastic and enquiring group who will question if unsure about anything even asking 'what is ivy?' which features in one of our favourite books.

The half term started with one of my favourite topics 'Healthy Me' where we started by discussing what foods we should eat more of and those we should not eat as much of. The children are now able to answer questions correctly about this, even knowing we need to drink water and milk in order to keep our bones healthy. We made 'healthy' lunchboxes, matched fruit and vegetables, painted some

fruit, threaded and made a 'P' fruit salad using pineapple, pears and plums. The children thoroughly enjoyed squeezing oranges and were fascinated to see the juice extract and to sample a little.

We then moved on to tooth care, discussing the importance of brushing, visiting the dentist as well as eating all those delicious fruit and vegetables we should be eating. News from Nursery (Tigers) Class

As the Spring term draws to a close, the children in Tiger Class are eagerly anticipating the Easter celebrations, the Bonnet Parade and the Easter Egg Hunt. The highlights for this half of the Spring term for them have been, dressing up as a character from a book for 'World Book Day' and a visit from Zoolab, where they had an opportunity to look closely and handle animals and Minibeasts. For Mother's Day the

children made cards, bookmarks and had a special message for their mums.



This term began with the topic 'Healthy Me' and it got the children talking about healthy food, exercise, cleanliness and dental hygiene. They sorted fruits and vegetables, learned about the importance of drinking plenty of water, getting a good night's sleep and good personal hygiene. The children spoke about their personal likes and dislikes and have been pointing out the healthy food in their



lunchboxes. They have been cooking healthy food in our play kitchen and serving it to their friends. They enjoyed listening to stories, Handa's Surprise and Whiffy Wilson.

Keeping planet Earth healthy and looking after its natural resources was our next topic where we talked about 'Recycling'. They learned to look for the recycling symbol, went litter picking in the playground and sorted it into recyclable and non-recyclable litter. They



listened to a song about the importance of looking after planet Earth and all the beautiful creatures that live on it. The poem 'Animals in Danger' proved to be very thought provoking and the story 'Duffy's Lucky Escape' highlighted the danger of plastics in our oceans for the animals.

For our topic 'Spring,' the children went for a walk in the garden spotting blossom on trees, Snowdrops, Daffodils, Crocuses, Bluebells, busy birds and Minibeasts. They looked at

a bird's nest, studied the life cycle of a Butterfly and a Frog, examined an Atlas moth, it's

egg and chrysalis shell. Creative activities included making Minibeast pictures using 2D

shapes, painting flowers, Ladybirds, making Dragonflies, putting Blossom on branches and learning songs. The children sowed Wildflower seeds in the garden and enjoyed digging and raking the soil.

Tiger class have continued to enjoy their cookery lessons and are looking forward to making chocolate nests for Easter. In Phonics lessons they have continued practising the sounds of the letters, the short vowel sounds, reading CVC words, practising forming letters and listening out for Rhyming words. In Maths, the children have been consolidating their understanding of all the topics, through practical work. Their hard work and enthusiasm for learning has been a joy to witness throughout the term.

Childcare Funding

A reminder that we participate in the Government's Scheme offering your child subsidised childcare per week. The funding commences the term **after** your child becomes eligible. All working parents who earn less than £100,000 a year can apply for working parent funding from the term after your child turns 9 months old. All parents, irrespective of income, can get 15 subsidised hours **from the term after your child's 3rd birthday**, starting on 1 January, 1 April or 1 September. It is the parent's responsibility to get all the relevant codes and information to the Nursery in time, so that money can be claimed. If you do not submit this information, the Nursery cannot offer you the funding and you will be liable for the full fees.

Early Years Foundation Stage Framework

Information for Parents and Carers

What Is the Early Years Foundation Stage Statutory Framework?

The Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) statutory framework is a government document that all schools and Ofsted-registered early years providers in England must follow. It sets standards for the learning, development and care of your child from birth to 5 years old. The standards ensure your child will learn and develop well and are kept healthy and safe.

* What Will My Child Be Learning?

The EYFS framework outlines seven areas of learning and development and educational programmes. There are three prime areas of learning, which are particularly important for your child's development and future learning:

communication and language

personal, social and emotional development

There are four specific areas of learning, through which the prime areas are strengthened and applied:

mathematics

understanding the world

expressive arts and design

Early years practitioners also use your child's needs and interests to plan challenging and enjoyable activities and experiences.

The How Will My Child Be Learning?

The EYFS framework identifies the essential role of play in your child's development. It is through both child-led play and play guided by an adult that your child will develop confidence and relationships with others. Through play, EYFS practitioners will help your child to extend their vocabulary and develop their communication skills.

The EYFS framework identifies three characteristics of effective teaching and learning:

playing and exploring

active learning

creating and thinking critically

Child with Phonics



Take your child on a listening walk around an indoor or outdoor setting. Encourage them to listen attentively and talk to you about the different sounds that they can hear.

Help your child to make a recycled musical instrument by adding rice to a water bottle to make a shaker, or using an empty tissue box and elastic bands to make a guitar. As they play their instrument, encourage them to experiment with ways that they can change the sound it makes, for example by placing it under a blanket.

Help your child to practise copying sounds by playing with rhythms. Clap out a simple rhythm. Can your child copy and clap it back to you? Take it in turns to be the leader, making up rhythms for the other to copy.

Sharing nursery rhymes with your child is a great way of introducing words that rhyme. Play around with traditional nursery rhymes by stopping before the final word of each # line. Can they finish the line with a word that rhymes?

Put together a basket of items with names that contain a different number of syllables, such as keys, pencil, hat, sticky tape. Go through each item, supporting your child to clap out the syllables as they say each item. Then, play a guessing

game, clap out the number of syllables for one of the items can your child guess which item from the basket it might be?

Help your child to begin to notice alliteration by playing silly list games. Tell them that you are making a shopping list, but you will only add

things beginning with the 's' sound, such as sausages, spaghetti, spiders. Can your child suggest other items for your shopping list? Repeat the game for different starting sounds.

As the time gets closer for your child to start school, start introducing some oral segmenting and blending into everyday routines. For example, when getting ready to leave the house say, 'put on your c-oa-t'. Can your child blend the sounds



When your child starts school it will also be useful if they can recognise their own name, as they will see it on coat pegs,

book bags and Draw jumpers. attention to their name around the home and help them to recognise the initial sound in books and on packaging and signs.
