They created lovely handprint leaves and helped decorate a colourful Autumn wreath. As we moved into Firework Day, the children enjoyed using paint and stamping to create their own bright and vibrant firework patterns. 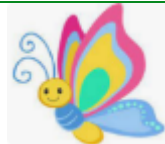
In January, Miss Chrissy moves to the Toddler room and Miss Pallavi to the baby room for another term of exciting activities, laughter and cuddles.

News From Pre-School (Parrot Class)

What a lovely half term we have had! It really has flown by, and we are so proud of how well the children have settled in, grown in confidence, and engaged in all of our activities. We have been incredibly busy and have enjoyed a wide variety of exciting experiences both indoors and outdoors.

We began the half term by learning about autumn and seasonal festivals. This topic captured the children's interest straight away. We talked about how autumn is a time of change, and the children loved observing the world around them. They learned that the weather becomes cooler, the days get shorter, and leaves change colour before falling to the ground. We went on an autumn hunt in the garden and around the outdoor area, collecting leaves, acorns, conkers, and twigs. The children looked closely at what they found and enjoyed describing their colours, shapes, and textures. We were lucky to spot squirrels in the garden too! This sparked a lovely discussion about how animals prepare for the colder months ahead. The children learned that squirrels gather acorns and hide them to eat during winter. We also talked about nocturnal animals, especially hedgehogs, and how they sleep during the day and come out at night. The children really enjoyed creating their own hedgehogs with playdough, and we added cinnamon to give the dough a special autumn smell. This made the activity not only creative but also a wonderful sensory experience.

Throughout the topic, we read lots of autumn themed stories, sang songs together, and created a fantastic range of autumn artwork using paint, collage materials, and natural resources. Their artwork looked beautiful on our display board and the children felt very proud when they saw their creations up on the wall. We also set up an autumn tuff tray with leaves, conkers, and pinecones for the children to explore through imaginative play.

Afterwards, we moved on to nursery rhymes, which the children absolutely loved. We spent time singing well known rhymes together each day, encouraging the children to join in with the words and actions. Nursery rhymes are fantastic for developing early language skills, memory, and rhythm. We provided lots of themed activities so the children could extend their play through looking after baby dolls by putting nappies on them and using the doctors' kit to check they were healthy. They also enjoyed playing with ducks in the water tray while singing "Five Little Ducks," which helped them practise early counting skills in a fun and playful way.

Recently, we have been getting into the Christmas spirit, and the excitement in the room has been wonderful to see. The children have been listening to and singing a variety of Christmas songs, practising new actions, and learning to



perform with confidence. They have also taken part in lots of festive arts and crafts, using glitter, paint, ribbons, and other craft materials to make decorations and gifts to take home. It has been lovely to watch their creativity and imagination shine as they explore different ways of designing and making things.

One of the highlights of this half term has definitely been our nativity preparations. The rehearsals are going extremely well, and the children have worked very hard to remember the songs and actions. Some children have even been practising at home! We know how special this performance will be for families, and we truly hope you enjoy watching it as much as we have enjoyed helping the children prepare.

Overall, it has been a fantastic half term full of learning, laughter, and new experiences. Every child has made wonderful progress, and we are very proud of each and every one of them. Thank you for your continued support, it makes such a difference.

News from Nursery (Tiger) Class

As we approach the end of the Autumn Term, the children are full of excitement as they look forward to the Christmas party, a visit from Santa, and their Nativity performance. They have been busy rehearsing while also keeping up with their topic work, phonics, maths, cooking and various art and craft activities.



After half term, our first topic was *Autumn*. The children enjoyed a walk around the school garden, collecting colourful leaves and acorns, spotting bare branches, and gathering leaves into a big pile to jump in. They acted out the story *We're Going on a Leaf Hunt*, travelling through a dark forest, climbing a mountain, rowing across a lake, and dashing away from a skunk! They created repeating patterns using conkers, acorns, leaves, twigs, and pinecones, made leaf prints, painted hedgehogs and squirrels, and mixed colours to paint Autumn leaves. We learned about hibernation, sang a song, and even added our own lines to include the hedgehog.



To mark Remembrance Day, the children made poppies and learned about the importance of the occasion. Bonfire Night sparked their curiosity about the story of Guy Fawkes, and they enjoyed painting colourful firework pictures.

Throughout this term, the children have continued practising their phonics and working on correct letter formation.

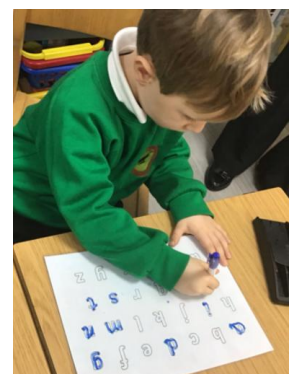
Our next story was *Jack and the Beanstalk*. The children loved listening to and acting out the story, sequencing the story with pictures, and spotting speech bubbles in storybooks. They sang the story as a song, coloured the pictures of characters and made masks. We created a giant beanstalk—almost the entire length of our room and the children added numbered leaves to it. They also used unifix cubes to measure beanstalks of different sizes, used shapes to build Jack's house, and drew the giant and the beanstalk on whiteboards.



We then moved on to our Christmas topic. The children listened to Christmas stories and shared how they planned to celebrate. They made wreaths and cards, painted candles and stockings, coloured festive pictures, and created cheerful reindeer. They were delighted to see their beautiful work displayed around the room, helping to bring a festive spirit to our classroom.

This half of the Autumn Term has flown by and the children have been wonderfully busy. They have worked hard and met every challenge with enthusiasm. I am incredibly proud of each one of them and would like to thank all our parents for their support, your involvement makes all their progress possible.

Start of the day

Just a reminder that our school day begins at 8:30am. The children ease into the morning with free play, and our planned activities start promptly at 9:00am. If your child arrives after this time, they may miss the morning welcome song, circle time, and some of our early learning activities. After 9:00am it may also take us a little longer to answer the door, as staff are busy supporting the children in the classroom. We know Nursery attendance isn't compulsory, and of course there is no penalty for arriving late. We simply want to make sure you're getting the most out of the time you're paying for, and that your child has the chance to enjoy all the lovely activities we have planned each morning.

No Nuts

Our school is a nut-free environment. Please ensure your child does not bring any food containing nuts to school. This includes items such as peanut butter and pesto, as pesto often contains pine nuts. We also kindly ask that you avoid sending foods with sesame seeds. While sesame is technically a seed, its proteins can sometimes trigger severe allergic reactions in individuals with nut allergies. Thank you for your support in helping us keep all our pupils safe.

Did you know that working families can get help with the cost of childcare through the **Tax-Free Childcare scheme**? Here's how it works:

- For every **£8** you pay into your childcare account, the government adds **£2** (up to a maximum of **£2,000 per child per year**, or **£4,000** for a child with a disability).
- The money in the account can be used to pay your nursery fees.

Supporting Your Child's Language Development

Helping your child develop strong language skills is one of the most valuable ways you can support their learning, confidence and future success. Children learn language best through everyday interactions, and there are lots of simple things you can do at home to encourage their communication.



1. Talk—about anything and everything!

Children learn new words by hearing them used in real situations. Whether you're cooking, walking to school or tidying up, try to talk about what you're doing. Describe objects, name actions and comment on what your child is showing interest in. These small moments build a rich vocabulary.

2. Read together every day

Sharing books is one of the most powerful ways to support language development. Look at the pictures together, talk about what might happen next and encourage your child to join in with repeated phrases. Even five minutes each day can make a big difference.

3. Encourage conversation

Give your child time to respond when you ask a question, and show that you value their ideas by listening carefully. Open-ended questions such as "What do you think will happen?" or "How did that make you feel?" help children develop more detailed sentences and expressive language.

4. Sing songs and rhymes

Nursery rhymes, action songs and simple chants help children hear the rhythms and patterns of language. They also support memory and listening skills—and they're fun to do together!

5. Limit background noise

Turning off the TV or radio during playtime and mealtimes helps your child focus on conversation. Children learn best when they can clearly hear speech and see your facial expressions.

6. Expand their language gently

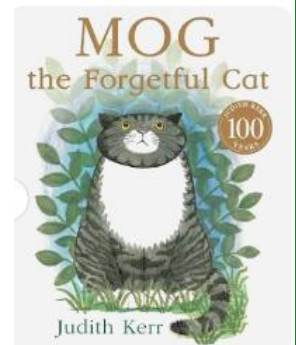
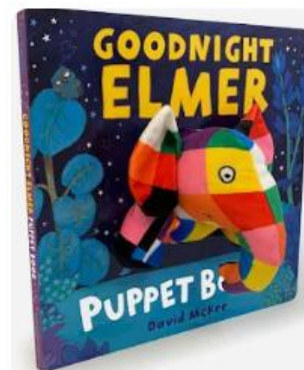
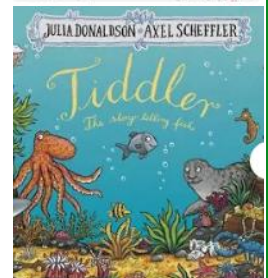
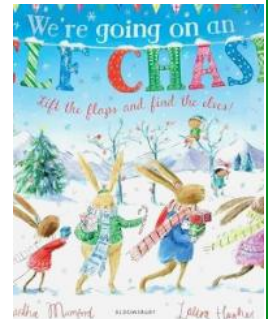
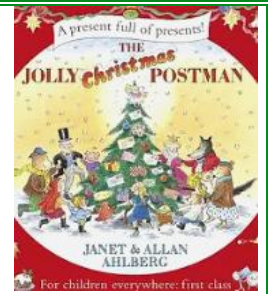
If your child says "car go," you might respond, "Yes, the red car is going fast!" This shows them how to build longer sentences without correcting or discouraging them.

- **Tiny Christmas Mini Story Pack:** Two sweet, small Christmas-themed stories — great for stockings or as a little festive surprise.



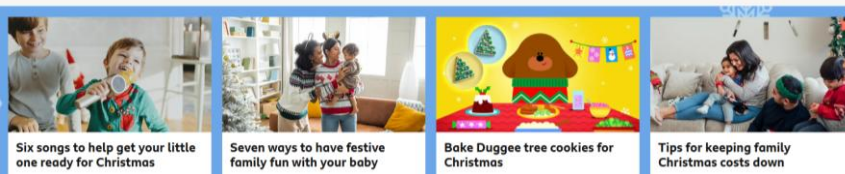
